Cal Law – Full CAC Vice Chair, Appointed by **District 1 Supervisor (P)**

Cal is a software engineer specializing in iOS application development, currently working on a mobile app to support doctors in their daily practice. Born and raised in the San Francisco Bay Area, they recently returned to the region to be closer to family and contribute to the local community. As a graduate of the Boards and Commissions Leadership Institute (BCLI), they also serve on the Geary Community Advisory Committee. As a dedicated member of the advisory committee, Cal is passionate about representing their district and championing equity and accessibility in the services provided by the SFPUC.

Erin Roach – Appointed by **District 2 Supervisor (WW)**

Erin Roach is a mission-driven strategist with extensive experience at the intersection of business, sustainability, and community leadership. Throughout her career, she has helped organizations—from early-stage startups to global corporations—use business as a force for positive social and environmental impact.

As an early team member at Bright Horizons Family Solutions, Erin helped scale the company from launch to \$200 million in revenue, pioneering corporate childcare services as both a business opportunity and a cultural shift for working families. She later co-founded GoCityKids, an online resource for urban parents, which was acquired by Viacom. At Social Venture Network and Presidio Graduate School, she strengthened communities of socially responsible leaders and advanced sustainable business education.

Erin also served as Vice President of Investor Relations and Marketing at Farmland LP, an impact investment fund that converted conventional farmland into organic, sustainable agriculture using an innovative twist on crop rotation with pasture-raised animals.

In addition to her professional work, Erin is an active civic leader in San Francisco. She co-founded and currently serves on the board of the Marina Community Association, led successful efforts to preserve public waterfront access, and represents District 2 on the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission Citizens' Advisory Committee. She brings a strong commitment to sustainability, equity, and community engagement to her role.

Sally Chen is a passionate advocate on issues of economic justice and educational equity for working-class immigrant communities, with experience in nonprofit direct service, grassroots organizing, and policy advocacy. She is currently the Education Equity Policy Manager at Chinese for Affirmative Action, where she advocates for universal, no-cost, and racially diverse K–16 education for all students. Before her current position, she managed a job center for Chinese immigrants and advocated for affirmative action policies in local hiring. As a first-generation college graduate from a working-class immigrant family, she is a proud alumna of Harvard College, where she also organized for racial justice issues. Most recently, Sally has been a Women in Leadership Fellow with Coro Northern California and an active community garden member at Francisco Park.

Douglas Jacuzzi – Full CAC Chair, Appointed by District 4 Supervisor (W and WW)

I grew up steeped in the pump industry. Barklee Sanders – Power Subcommittee Chair, Appointed by District 6 Supervisor (P)

Barklee Sanders is a current Treasure Island resident who moved to the area after getting back on his feet from being a homeless veteran. After persistent hard work and dedication, he started working for Facebook, that gave him the insight into how using innovative technologies can solve systemic problems. He is now dedicated to using his knowledge and expertise to help the community that he is a part of.

Barklee became aware of the long-term issue of power outages affecting the community after moving to the Island in 2017 when there were seven sporadic outages within the first eight weeks of him living there. He realized that the community being affected is statistically at risk as a great percentage of residents are aged-out youth from foster programs, formerly homeless, veterans, and others in need of supportive housing. With his background of being a homeless veteran himself, he knew that he wanted to use his voice to raise awareness of the issues that disrupt the Island and the lives of vulnerable citizens.

Julia Alicia Hernandez – Appointed by **District 7** Supervisor (P)

Julia is a 15-year resident of San Francisco with roots in Los Angeles and Mexico. She earned her undergraduate degree from San Francisco State University, where she majored in Latina/o Studies and Labor Studies, and developed a deep commitment to economic and social justice.

With a strong foundation in student organizing, Julia began her career working with labor unions, including UNITE HERE Local 2 and SEIU 2015. Over the past several years, she has built a career in public service with the City and County of San Francisco, engaging in interconnected work across mental health, workforce development, and economic equity.

Currently, Julia serves as a Contract Compliance Specialist with the Office of Community Investment & Infrastructure (OCII), where she helps enforce policies that prioritize residents and small businesses, prevent displacement, and support the return of residents displaced by past redevelopment in emerging communities throughout the city.

Her commitment to civic engagement led her to complete the Boards and Commissions Leadership Institute (BCLI) in 2025. Julia's lived experiences continue to inform her advocacy, particularly around equity in access to and the quality of public utilities. Growing up in a working-class immigrant community in Southeast Los Angeles, she experienced firsthand the impacts of unsafe and unreliable drinking water. Later, while living in Mexico City, recurring power outages in her neighborhood followed the transition from a publicly operated electric utility to a private provider. Disruptions that had profound effects on residents' daily lives. These experiences continue to shape her commitment to public accountability, infrastructure equity, and community-centered policy.

Amy Nagengast – Wastewater Subcommittee Chair, Appointed by District 8 Supervisor (W & WW)

Amy is the San Francisco International Airport's Energy Manager on topics related to energy planning, analysis, commissioning, and management. Previously, Amy worked as a Senior Energy Engineer at Bright Power where she designed and implemented water and energy retrofits in large low-income and market rate multifamily properties throughout California. To support California's Climate Goals, Amy has experience in retrofitting large central domestic hot water systems from natural gas to electricity using heat pump water heaters. Early in her career, Amy designed and oversaw capital improvement projects for water and wastewater treatment plants and distribution networks. Amy enjoys tackling problems using integrated data modeling and visualization to facilitate strategic decision making surrounding interrelated issues of climate, energy, resource planning, growth, building construction and infrastructure systems.
