

Our Mission as a Utility Agency



At the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC), our mission is to provide quality water and wastewater services to the city of San Francisco, wholesale water to three Bay Area counties, and green hydroelectric and solar power to our municipal departments. We strive to work in harmony with environmental and community interests, and we are dedicated to protecting and sustaining the resources entrusted to our care.

We are proud to be widely recognized as a national leader for excellent service, stewardship, and innovation. We became the first utility agency in the nation to adopt <u>Environmental Justice (2009)</u> and <u>Community Benefits (2011)</u> policies. These policies created our Community Benefits Division which upholds our mission by fostering a healthy environment and promoting vibrant neighborhoods. Additionally, in 2020, our agency took significant action in adopting our <u>Racial Justice Resolution</u> which condemns systemic racism and advocates for racial justice for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) staff and communities. These progressive policies serve as a guiding framework for our agency to advance social, environmental, and racial justice.

Community Benefits Annual Report Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Executive Summary

To fulfill our agency's mission, our Community Benefits team designs and implements a variety of programs related to our Community Benefits and Environmental Justice Policies and the Racial Justice Resolution. Our programs include public art, vibrant gardens and community centers, environmental education, career development in the utility industry, and community investments from SFPUC contractors.

Our Community Benefits Annual Report captures the programs, activities, partnerships, and accomplishments by our team that advance our mission and guiding policies. This report is aligned with the City and County of San Francisco's Fiscal Year 2023-2024 which covers July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024, and highlights the work of our team during this timeframe. This report is one of the many ways our team upholds our values of transparency and accountability to our community, our partners, and our ratepayers.

Program Highlights

Art

The City and County of San Francisco requires all City agencies to contribute 2% of all aboveground construction project costs for public art. SFPUC's Westside Pump Station installed its first mural at the facility. The mural titled **Fog Lilies** by Jet Martinez is composed of a series of hand-paintings inspired by Calla lily flowers and the artist's childhood home in Cuernavaca, Mexico.

Environmental Justice and Land Use

At our agency, Environmental Justice means that people of all races, cultures, and incomes are treated fairly. This year we engaged Bayview Hunters Point environmental justice organizations to brainstorm strategies to offset the air quality impacts from our construction projects such as the Biosolids Digester Facility Project (BDFP). Through our debt relief program, Customer Affordability and Arrearage Management Pilot Program (CAAMPP), we have piloted debt support services to prevent water shut offs and reduce customer water and sewer bill debt. This year nearly \$600,000 was disbursed to over 400 low-income customers with water and sewer bill debt enrolled in SFPUC's Customer Assistance Program.

We repurpose underutilized SFPUC land into spaces that benefit the public such as vibrant community gardens. Garden for the Environment is a halfacre education and demonstration garden that's been operating for over 30 years! This year they hosted over 100 workshops and field trips and nearly 10,000 visitors and workshop participants experienced 9,498 hours of environmental education. Hummingbird Farm, operated by the nonprofit PODER (People Organizing to Demand Environmental Justice and Economic Rights), cultivates environmental stewardship in a manner that is culturally appropriate for surrounding communities. Through a wide variety of rich cultural activities, they produced 1,350 lbs of food, restored 931 native plants, hosted 16 apprentices and interns, and held 127 events focused on environmental education while promoting community building.

Education

The SFPUC offers free learning opportunities to educate youth on how to become active environmental stewards. At our College Hill Learning Garden (CHLG), students are immersed in a shared urban habitat and engage in activities that create connections between their school curriculum, SFPUC water, power, and sewer concepts, and our environment. This year our team hosted **90 field trips**, with **2,143 students** and **366 adult volunteers**. Our Education team facilitated educational green infrastructure tours at the College Hill Learning Garden for **58 youth** and Transitional Aged Youth (ages 18 – 24). The CHLG hosted **2 interns** through YouthWorks and **3 interns** through the SFUSD College and Career Readiness Summer Internship program.

Our Bayview Science Institute (BSI) is a partnership between the SFPUC and the California Academy of Sciences which offers a transformative professional learning opportunity to deepen the science and environmental literacy of Kindergarten – 5th grade teachers and students. This year **28 educators** from Bayview elementary schools participated in this yearlong program that offers professional development training, coaching sessions, and curriculum planning sessions.

Workforce

Our Workforce approach starts by exposing youth, young adults, and teachers to SFPUC water, power, and sewer services to empower students to be environmental stewards of our systems and infrastructure and expose them to career pathways at SFPUC. Through our keystone Project Learning Grants (PLG) program, we partnered with **16 organizations** to serve **455 youth participants** through summer and afterschool programming.

Through our innovative partnership with SFUSD's John O'Connell High School (JOCHS) **257 students** encountered SFPUC-aligned curriculum, **95 students** participated in a work-based learning opportunity at an SFPUC site or with SFPUC staff, and **43 freshman students** attended an immersive two-day field trip to Camp Mather to see our Hetch-Hetchy Reservoir.

We also hosted our annual internship and entrylevel career fair, Futures Fair, at the Southeast Community Center. By collaborating with other City Departments and nonprofits nearly **60 youth** left the event equipped with the resources needed to begin their career journey with the City and County of San Francisco. In partnership with SFPUC Contractor, Stantec PCL, and IgnitEd, we hosted **17 SFUSD teachers** for a week-long teacher externship event called Science in the City.

Southeast Community Center

The Southeast Community Center (SECC) continues to serve as a vibrant hub where our local community can gather, learn, play, and grow together. This year, the SECC hosted over **1,800 events** that brought over **55,000 visitors**. The Resident Partners at SECC are community-based organizations who offer programs and services on-site at the center. This year the **9 Resident Partners** served **1,860** individuals and **62% are SF District 10 residents** (94124, 94107, 94134). SECC Resident Partners hosted **66 events**, enriching **2,514 lives**, and creating opportunities for growth and connection.

With our commitment to Environmental Justice and Land Use, we have engaged with over **400 community members** to date, making use of more than **15,000 square feet** of available indoor and outdoor space. Additionally, air quality monitors were installed in partnership with community organizations.

Social Impact Partnerships

Our Social Impact Partnership (SIP) program creates an opportunity for firms who have contracts with SFPUC to demonstrate their corporate social responsibility by voluntarily contributing financial donations and volunteer hours to nonprofit organizations and public education providers in the communities we operate in. This year, SIP firms contributed **over \$4.4M** to programs focused on job exposure and internships, environment and community health, education, small business support, and housing and economic support across **9 counties** in our service area.

Honoring Nature, Culture, and Community

The City and County of San Francisco requires all City agencies to contribute 2% of all aboveground construction project costs for public art. SFPUC's Westside Pump Station pumps the sanitary and stormwater flow from the west side of the City to the Oceanside Treatment Plant, which serves 20% of San Francisco's population. In partnership with the San Francisco Arts Commission and Oakland-based artist, Jet Martinez, we commissioned the first mural installation at the facility.

Fog Lilies is composed of a series of hand-painted murals which decorate the upper areas of the Westside Pump Station. The artist Jet Martinez was inspired by the natural beauty of Calla lily flowers and the landscape of his childhood home in Cuernavaca, Mexico. The flower's clean lines are meant to evoke a sense of purity, which references the cleansing and treatment functions that the Westside Pump Station performs as an essential city service. The design features colors that represent the flower and bring to mind the often cool and overcast climate of Ocean Beach.



Upholding Our Values

At our agency, Environmental Justice (EJ) means that people of all races, cultures, and incomes are treated fairly. We believe that no group of people should experience negative environmental consequences from the operations, programs, or policies of the SFPUC. To uphold these EJ principles, we are committed to reducing negative environmental impacts and ensuring that public benefits are shared across all communities.

Mitigating Negative Impacts

Our team is committed to reducing emissions of harmful chemicals from our operational facilities. This year we engaged with Bayview Hunters Point environmental justice organizations to brainstorm strategies to offset air quality impacts from our <u>Biosolids Digester Facility Project (BDFP)</u>. The BDFP will replace and relocate the outdated waste treatment facilities with more reliable, efficient, and

modern technologies and facilities. As this project develops, our team will continue to identify different ways to lessen any negative impacts from the project.

Debt Relief for Low-Income Customers

We believe that access to water is a human right, and we are dedicated to providing safe, reliable, and affordable services. Through our Customer Affordability and Arrearage Management Pilot Program (CAAMPP), we have piloted support services to prevent water shut offs and reduce customer water and sewer bill debt. Customers in this program are surveyed to better understand their financial situations, their experience with the SFPUC and what support is most helpful to them. With our advocacy, nearly \$600,000 was successfully disbursed to over 400 low-income customers with water and sewer bill debt enrolled in the <u>SFPUC</u> <u>Customer Assistance Program</u>.

Revitalizing Public Land

Located at 1590 7th Avenue, is a half-acre education and demonstration garden in the Inner Sunset neighborhood of San Francisco. This garden has been operating for over 30 years by the nonprofit, <u>Garden for the Environment</u>, which teaches gardening practices and aims to inspire and educate visitors of all ages and backgrounds.

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Hummingbird Farm

Located at Crocker Amazon Park in the Excelsior neighborhood of San Francisco, is a healing space that cultivates environmental stewardship in a manner that is culturally appropriate to surrounding EJ communities. The space is operated by the nonprofit, <u>PODER</u> (People Organizing to Demand Environmental Justice and Economic Rights). PODER brings the local community together around environmental education and sustainable farming. They host cultural celebrations tied to the land and helping restore surrounding native grasslands.

Inspiring Youth


The SFPUC offers free learning opportunities to educate youth on how to become active environmental stewards. Our immersive and transformative educational programs incorporate real-world examples from SFPUC's operations into curriculum for students.

College Hill Learning Garden

The College Hill Learning Garden, located at 336 Elsie Street in Bernal Heights, is an outdoor learning space created to nurture and expand Kindergarten - 12th grade environmental education for students across San Francisco by providing free field trips, educational tours, and paid internships. At the garden, students are immersed in a shared, urban habitat and engage in stewardship activities around a variety of different topic areas that create connections between their school curriculum, SFPUC water, power, and sewer concepts, and our environment. Students who attend the field trip program leave with a richer understanding of the environment we live in, the interconnected systems that create healthy, living cities, and the stewardship practices needed to care for and maintain a healthy environment.

Green Infrastructure Tours at the College Hill Learning Garden

The College Hill Learning Garden team facilitated green infrastructure (GI) tours for 58 youth and transitional aged youth (ages 18 - 24) living and working in San Francisco. The garden has many sustainable features such as solar panels and off-grid energy system, a composting toilet, a habitat pond, and bio-retention gardens. The GI tours expose participants to GI design functions on site that conserve and recycle water with permeable surfaces, along with a network of drains, pumps, and water catchment systems such as barrels, tanks, and pipe containers. During GI tours participants learn about sustainable waste streams, water cycling, renewable energy, and stewardship practices through hands-on learning and exploration.

Work Based Learning at the College Hill Learning Garden

Our College Hill Learning Garden educators hosted 2 YouthWorks interns between fall and spring and during the summer hosted 3 interns through the SFUSD College and Career Readiness Summer Internship 6-week program. The interns participated in a variety of engaging learning activities and even hiked a tour of the Crystal Springs Reservoir.

Bayview Science Institute

The Bayview Science Institute (BSI) is a partnership between the SFPUC and the California Academy of Sciences. Which offers a transformative professional learning opportunity to deepen the science and environmental literacy of Kindergarten – 5th grade teachers and students in the Bayview neighborhood. In order to empower all students to see themselves as independent thinkers and realworld problem-solvers and introduce the operations of the SFPUC.

This year, 28 educators from Bayview elementary schools participated in this yearlong program that offers professional development training, coaching sessions, and curriculum planning sessions. Teachers are provided with SFPUC educational materials, such as the *Big Ideas* Curriculum developed by the SFPUC, and learn how to incorporate water, power, and sewer concepts into project-based learning. After participating in the Bayview Science Institute teachers report a 70% increase in teaching science.

The Future of Our Workforce

The SFPUC aspires to be an employer-of-choice by making well-paid unionized career paths and opportunities visible to the public. Our approach starts by exposing youth, young adults, and teachers to SFPUC water, power, and sewer services to empower students to be environmental stewards of our systems and infrastructure. Our strategic recruitment for a skilled and diverse workforce is reflective of the communities that we serve. We partner with schools and nonprofits – through external programs such as San Francisco Youthworks and the JVS (Jewish Vocational Service) Internship Program – to build an awareness of the careers and green jobs that make the services of the SFPUC possible. workforce. Our grant program is to ensure that San Francisco youth and young adults have access to employment, educational opportunities, and are positioned for success. The PLG program supports summer and afterschool programs to teach youth about water, wastewater and clean power concepts using our pre-designed curriculum, resulting in a final "capstone" project.

One of our grantee partners, BAYCAT, produced a short film called "Birds by the Bay" about SFPUC's secondary land use site, Hummingbird Farm, which is stewarded by, PODER, another PLG grantee.


Teacher Externship

In partnership with SFPUC Contractors, Stantec PCL, and IgnitEd, we hosted 17 SFUSD teachers for a week-long externship event called <u>Science in the City</u>. The goal of this program is to provide San Francisco's teachers with the tools and learning opportunities to teach their students about the connections between geology, biology, environmental justice, and the infrastructure of their city, as well as to their future careers. Over the course of the week, we explored the science and civics behind the SFPUC's and our contractors' operations.

Our participating teachers toured sites across the city that included: the SFPUC Oceanside Water Treatment Plant, Presidio Archeology Lab, El Polin Spring, Learning Station at the Oceanside Tunnel Tops, the Treasure Island Museum, and the Treasure Island Sailing Center. Participants also attended a panel on Treasure Island to learn about the development, expansion, and liquification on the island.

John O'Connell High School

We have created an innovative partnership with SFUSD's John O'Connell High School (JOCHS) that provides teachers with the resources to design integrated curriculum that's centered around the water, power, and sewer operations of the SFPUC, environmental stewardship, and utility careers. This deepens student learning of environmental stewardship and exposes youth to various careers and professionals at the SFPUC. This year, 257 students learned about the integrated curriculum and 95 students participated in learning opportunities at SFPUC by shadowing an employee or touring a site. Through our transformative two-day fieldtrip to Camp Mather and the Hetch-Hetchy Reservoir, 43 freshman students had the opportunity to visit the site and experience the reservoir first-hand. These initiatives allow students to see the importance of stewarding the natural resources entrusted to the SFPUC.

Futures Fair

This year we hosted our annual Futures Fair at the Southeast Community Center, which is an internship and entry-level career fair. Several City departments including the Department of Environment, Recreation and Parks Department, and the Office of Economic and Workforce Development attended to showcase their youth programs. Additionally, various SFPUC teams such as the Crystal Springs' Watershed Keepers, Water Quality Technicians from the Natural Resources and Lands Management Division, and our Community Benefits staff were present to talk about their professional roles and highlight opportunities to join their teams. Local organizations, such as Young Community Developers and YouthWorks, also presented paid internship opportunities to the attendees. Thanks to this collaborative effort, nearly 60 young people left the event equipped with the resources needed to begin their career journey with the City and County of San Francisco!

For the Culture

One of the many highlights this year was the annual Black History Month Parade and Festival, which drew more than 1,000 community members creating lasting memories while honoring Black culture and history. The celebration featured a standout gumbo contest, hosted by Chef Dontaye Ball, Founder of Gumbo Social.

SECC also partnered with the San Francisco General Hospital Foundation to install one of their iconic heart sculptures at the center. It is the first heart sculpture to be installed in San Francisco District 10. Designed by artist André Renay, the heart called 'Justice' honors civil rights leaders like Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., John Lewis, and others who fought for voting rights, it also reflects the future of the Black Lives Matter movement. This special installation serves as a powerful symbol of our shared values, commitment to justice, and community spirit.



Promoting Land Use Opportunities at the Southeast Community Center

There are endless opportunities for the future of the Southeast Community Center. Our Environmental Justice and Land Use team works closely with the Southeast Community Center and its stakeholders to identify creative ways to utilize the green spaces on site. Our team has brainstormed innovate ways to activate the 15,000 square feet of green space available to create a positive environment. We engaged with over 400 community members to-date through public workshops, focus groups, two online community surveys, votes from boards placed at the center, and presentations to the Southeast Community Facility Commission and its subcommittees. With community input, we have transformed the vacant area into a space for outdoor markets, health and wellness activities, and environmental education.

Upon graduation, Rachel was offered a project manager trainee role at SMCI, an SFPUC partner. Now, she's thriving in her new position, excited about the career growth ahead.

Her journey highlights the life-changing impact of the Tuolumne Community Collaborative Preapprenticeship program. This program not only equips participants with technical skills but also essential soft skills, preparing them for success in construction and related fields. With a 91% job placement rate and 90% retention, many graduates land union jobs or positions with local employers.
